## RTSD Considerations for a Before or After Labor Day Start February 2023

Ending the school year late in June provides little instructional benefit to students, as cumulative standardized examinations (Advanced Placement, PSSAs, Keystone Exams) are administered in the end of April and throughout the month of May. All eligible content must be covered prior to the administration of these exams. Planning an instructional calendar that has multiple school days that fall well after the required curriculum has been covered and assessed is not instructionally sound. In addition, when the school year runs late, families who send their children to camps end up missing the first week of summer programming. When considering when to start school and the impact on the end of the school year, RTSD's historical data is as follows:

To acknowledge the diversity of our community, RTSD recently added new holidays to our calendar (Eid al Fitr, Eid al Adha, Diwali, Lunar New Year, Juneteenth) in addition to those we historically have observed (Fourth of July, Labor Day, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's Day, MLK Day, Presidents Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day). When any of these holidays fall within a typical workweek (Monday through Friday), there will be no school for students. RTSD also has three of our schools that currently serve as polling places for primary and general elections and has a tradition of a week-long Spring Break. These constraints need to be accounted for when determining when the last day of the school year will be.

To honor the desires of some in the community who wish to maintain a post-Labor Day start, but also recognizing the pedagogical issues with a late June school end date, RTSD administration recommends ending the school year for students on or before June 14 each year (essentially the second week of June). To that end, the district should utilize remote instructional days when necessary, and consider a before Labor Day start on years when Labor Day falls later in September, but keeping a traditional post-Labor Day start on years Labor Day falls earlier in September, dependent upon how many federal and religious holidays fall within a typical workweek that year.
